Scope and Content

The History department records spanning the years 1932 through 1999 comprise 7.5 linear feet and have been arranged into ten series and include minutes, agendas, memoranda, syllabi, proposals, reports, studies, and alumni data. Some of the individual accessions were processed before all of the records were compiled into this collection.



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Series

Series 1: Minutes and Agendas, 1931 – 1999. Boxes 1-3

This series provides the department meeting minutes, some graduate program meeting minutes, and some agenda for both meetings. It is not exhaustive.

Series 2: Department Chair Memoranda & General Memoranda, 1980 – 1998. Boxes 3-4

This series provides the Department Chair memoranda. The memoranda were produced on a monthly basis during the academic year. It also provides general department memoranda alerting faculty to meetings, policies, etc. It is not exhaustive.

Series 3: Course Descriptions and Syllabi, 1975 – 1980. Boxes 4-6

The majority of these records are course syllabi/ground rules from Fall semester 1974 to Spring Semester 1982. There are only a few records on summer sessions. With the exception of a small number of 400-level courses, only undergraduate courses are represented. The records are not exhaustive.

Series 4: Graduate Program, 1966 – 1991. Boxes 6-7

This series provides general memos regarding the graduate program offerings, requirements, and organization. It also includes proposals for the Public History program.

Series 5: Administrative, 1955 – 1990. Box 8-9

The records in this series include departmental reports and studies, undergraduate manuals. They also address undergraduate and graduate financial aid concerns as well as faculty as staff issues such as course loads and tenure.

Series 6: Special Events, 1955 – 1982. Box 10

These records reflect colloquium and symposium (co-)organized or (co-)sponsored by the History Department. For the Agents of Change Symposium, see Accession UA1998.11, J. Gagliano, boxes 1-2.

Series 7: Phi Alpha Theta History Honorary, 1970-1982. Box 11

Series seven contains records from or regarding the History Honorary Society, Phi Alpha Theta (ΦΑΘ). The Loyola Chi Mu (XM) chapter of Phi Alpha Theta was granted its charter in 1976.

Series 8: Lyons Masters Essay Contest, 1959 – 1969. Box 12-13

The Loyola University Chicago History Department and the Loyola Press began the Lyons Master's Essay Competition in 1959-60 to assess and elevate the status of the Masters in History degree in American universities. Along with their essay, contestants provided basic information regarding their graduate coursework and the research,



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funding, and supervision of the essay. Only the essay was evaluated. The History department used the other information as part of its study. Students could submit their Masters essays (or thesis, depending on the regulations of their program and institution) to the contest for the academic year in which they had written them and received their degree. The Loyola Press published the winning essays to promote the value of high-caliber work in History Masters programs. Each year several scholarly journals published the name of the winner and two honorable mention awards along with the guidelines for the next year's contest. The first contest was held in 1960. In 1963, the committee decided that no publishable essays existed in the small number of applications received. The ninth and final contest was in 1968. After advertising and receiving applications for the tenth annual competition, the Essay committee decided to suspend the it pending 1) an appraisal of the effectiveness of the award in encouraging significant scholarship at the Master's level and 2) a review of its value to the history profession. The Lyons competition was never re-established.

Series 9: Alumni Data, 1926 – 1985. Box 14

These records provide information about the number and type of degrees awarded, and career days held at Loyola. The records also include alumni placement updates and alumni surveys

Series 10: Programs, 1954 – 1982. Boxes 14-15

Series ten covers programs and institutes sponsored or co-sponsored by the History Department. Other program organizers included other Loyola Departments as well as organizations from outside the University. Some programs were one-time events, others were intended to be long-standing, such as the proposed MLA Degree program with Rosary College or the proposed Ethnic Studies Program with Northern Illinois University. This series does not cover established graduate degree programs such as Public History that are based on the regular course offerings of the Loyola History Department.

Series 11: Restricted, 1968, 1973. Box 16

This series includes one file on the potential hiring of Staughton Lynd and one file on the assignment of members to a dissertation committee.
