Biographical Sketch

Jerome Vincent Jacobsen was born in Chicago on September 27, 1894, the eldest son of James and Catherine Jacobsen, and attended both St. Ignatius High School and Loyola University from 1909 to 1915. In 1915 he entered the Society of Jesus and was ordained in 1928. He received his A.B. from Gonzaga University in 1921 and an M.A. in Philosophy in 1922; an M.A. in History from St. Louis University in 1927; and a Ph.D. in History from the University of California, Berkley, in 1934, where he worked under Herbert E. Bolton, a noted Latin Americanist.

Upon his return to Loyola University Chicago in 1934, he was a professor in the History department, specializing in United States and Latin American history; superior of the Loyola Jesuit community; member of Loyola's board of trustees; director of the Institute of Jesuit History and editor of its journal, *Mid-America*, a position he held for over 30 years. Among his publications were Educational Foundations of the Jesuits in the 16th Century Spain (1938) and numerous articles to various journals. As editor of *Mid-America*, Fr. Jacobsen oversaw the growth of the journal from one dedicated solely to the history of Jesuits in the Mississippi Valley area, to one that included articles from historians in all fields.

Jerome V. Jacobsen, S.J., passed away at the Jesuit residence of Loyola University Chicago on August 19, 1970.

Scope and Content

The Jerome V. Jacobsen, S.J., papers span the years 1916 to 1980, 2.25 linear feet, and consist of correspondence, invitations, programs, constitutions and by-laws, minutes, reports, clippings, book reviews, financial statements, transcripts and grades, family information, bibliographies of publications, articles and reprints, lectures and speeches, sermons, committee work records, photo static copies of documents, photographs (Jesuit colleges), and research notes. Subjects include the Institute of Jesuit

History, *Mid-America*, Brazil, Mexico, Jacques Marquette, Jesuit colleges, and Loyola University Chicago committees.

Series

Series 1: Institute of Jesuit History (IJH), 1933-1980, Box 1-2

This series contains a history and constitution of the Institute of Jesuit History; meeting minutes; correspondence; financial statements; mailing lists; reprints; and articles.

Series 2: Personal Records, 1930-1970, Boxes 2-3

This series contains biographical materials including transcripts, baptismal certificates, and family information; bibliographies of publications; lectures and programs; sermons; Loyola University Chicago committee notes; correspondence; and obituaries.
