Biography

Born in 1872 in Cincinnati, Ohio, he enrolled at St. Xavier College (now Xavier University) and received his bachelor's degree in 1893. He entered the Society of Jesus shortly after graduation and was ordained a priest in 1907. From 1909 to 1911 he studied social economics at the universities of Innsbruck and Vienna and returned to the US convinced of the necessity of social welfare programs.

Siedenburg was assigned to Loyola University Chicago in 1911. In 1913 he organized the University Lecture Bureau focusing on social action. The Lecture Bureau was renamed the School of Sociology in 1914 and later renamed again to the School of Social Work, the first Catholic School of Social Work in the United States. While at Loyola, Siedenburg also founded Downtown College (University College) in 1914 and the School of Business Administration in 1926; served as regent for and reorganized the School of Law in 1921; and established the Home Study Division (Correspondence Study Division) in 1922.

In 1932, Siedenburg was transferred to the University of Detroit, where he served as the executive dean until his death in 1939.



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Scope and Content

The Siedenburg collection spans the years 1911 to 1989 (primarily 1911 to 1939) and comprise 1.0 linear foot of correspondence, news articles, programs, scrapbooks, and writings about Siedenburg.

Arrangement: Chronological within series.

Notes

This collection merges accession numbers 1988.01, 1989.28, 1990.09, and 1998.06. Some materials are copies of correspondence at the archives of the Archdiocese of Chicago, Malinckrodt College archives, and the University of Detroit archives. The University of Detroit records were created by Albert H. Poetker, S.J., president of the University of Detroit at the time Siedenburg's death. Poetker was the principal contact with Siedenburg's family, especially Otto King and John King, his half-brother and nephew respectively.

Series 1: Personal, 1911, 1935-1940, Undated. Box 1

This series includes Siedenburg's vow of poverty, Siedenburg family information, and a list of professional activities.

Series 2: Death of Siedenburg, 1939-1942, 1949, 1954. Box 1

This series includes correspondence, obituaries, and news articles relating to Siedenburg's death. The majority of this series contains correspondence with Fr. Poetker of the University of Detroit.

Series 3: Professional, 1915-1928. Box 1

This series contains programs and correspondence relating to Siedenburg's activities in Chicago.

Series 4: Loyola University, Chicago, 1913-1914, 1932-1933, 1980. Box 2

Two scrapbooks covering the University Lecture Bureau from 1913 to 1914, a bulletin from the School of Social Work, and a proposal to name the School of Social Work building Siedenburg Hall.

Series 5: Publications, 1912, 1953, 1980, 1988-1989. Box 2

This series contains writings about Siedenburg in addition to a 1912 edition of *The Child in the City* inscribed by Siedenburg.
