Administrative History

The Stritch School of Medicine began in 1909 when the then independent Illinois Medical School affiliated with Loyola University. In 1910 the Bennett College of Medicine bought both the Illinois Medical School and the Reliance Medical College and became the medical department of Loyola University, passing entirely under the control of the University in 1915. Henry Spalding, S.J., was the first Regent of the school and William Rittenhouse, M.D., was the first dean. Loyola purchased the Chicago College of Medicine and Surgery in 1917, providing property and facilities on South Wolcott Avenue close to the Cook County Hospital for the Medical department. Accreditation from the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association was attained February 9, 1920. In the 1940s, Samuel Cardinal Stritch took an interest in the fortunes of Loyola's medical school and hosted the first of what would become an annual fundraising dinner. After Cardinal Stritch passed away in 1948, the Medical School was renamed the Stritch School of Medicine in his honor. During the 1960s, the Medical School out-grew its home and found a new one in Maywood, Illinois, where a new medical school and 504 bed teaching hospital was constructed on a 60-acre tract of land, thus creating the permanent home of the Stritch School of Medicine and the Loyola University Medical Center.
